





















An interview with 2021 Jim Lavelle Award winner: Joel Davies

What does winning the Jim Lavelle Award mean to you?



Diversity Equity & Inclusion Committee – A Year in Review

It's been just over a year since the murder of George Floyd – an unarmed black man who died at the hands of a police officer on May 25, 2020, in Minnesota. I think it's important to note this event because the graphic nature of the video captured by a teenaged girl triggered the global outrage, protest and passion that fueled many conversations and actions over the past year. It led to the creation of many Diversity, Equity & Inclusion (DEI) roles at major organizations, and pledges to support black-owned businesses. In fact, it led to the startup of the Whitby Chamber of Commerce Diversity Equity & Inclusion Committee and many others like it.

My hope is that we keep the same energy for years to come – the outrage at anti-black racism, the anger about the despicable state of race relations in the world, and the passion and commitment to do something about it.

Whitby Chamber of Commerce CEO, Natalie Prychitko, reached out to me and several other business and community leaders to see if we would be interested in being a part of a DEI committee. The idea being that the Chamber needed to better reflect the diverse nature of local business leaders, their employees and the community at large – providing useful resources to its membership in a fast-changing social environment.



I agreed to join the committee with the condition that it had to make a difference rather than simply check a box. Natalie agreed that we would absolutely be focused on action, and she has stayed true to her word. Now as Chair of the DEI committee, I too share in this responsibility.

Over the past year we've built a team of dedicated volunteer committee members who hail from a wide range of backgrounds, identities, work experiences and lived experiences. Our committee members have given many hours of their time to help build a solid DEI foundation for the Chamber for years to come.

The purpose of the committee is to be a catalyst in our business community, fostering and institutionalizing policies, practices and strategies to support and accelerate DEI goals within it. We've built a workplan that has articulated action items that support our efforts to better recognize, support, celebrate and amplify the voices of underrepresented groups in the Whitby

business community.

Perhaps our biggest achievement to date has been the hosting of the Chamber's first-ever Black History Month event in February 2021 which attracted speakers and guests from across Canada. Due to the recommendation of the DEI committee and the inaugural event's success, the BHM event has been elevated to one of the Chamber's signature events which means greater exposure, attention and sponsorship opportunities.

While we believe this is a strong start, there's so much more to do. I want to thank Natalie for inviting me to be a part of the DEI committee and I'd like to thank our amazing group of volunteers for their time, knowledge and willingness to give of themselves. While I've shared my work and lived experiences as a part of this journey, I can honestly say I've gained so much more from the incredible team of smart, driven, fun and passionate people on our DEI committee.

I would encourage anyone to get involved however you can, whether you're at school, work or play – systemic racism, homophobia, inequity and lack of representation permeate all aspects of life. You can make a difference within your own sphere of influence.

Diversity is a gift that allows us to enrich our lives, and to learn about people and experiences that are different from our own. It's an important time to listen, particularly to people who haven't had a platform or voice in the past because of who they are or where they're from. Perhaps just as important is unlearning many of our ways of thinking, including the language we use, recognizing that many of the structures in place were borne out of systemic racism, sexism and homophobia. Unlearning isn't easy – it will take practice and it can feel overwhelming. But keep trying, keep listening, keep learning and keep growing.

Collaboration! COVID-19 Antigen Tests

For the last 10 weeks, the Whitby Chamber of Commerce in partnership with the Town of Whitby distributed COVID-19 antigen testing kits free to businesses. Together, we distributed 9,875 tests to the business community! Now that September is upon us, the Town of Whitby will be using their building for municipal programming, and as such, on August 31st we delivered 6,125 tests to the Clarington Board of Trade.

Any business can continue to order them from Clarington https://www.cbot.ca/rapidscreening/, and those that obtained

their tests from us are still required to report on their results weekly through our reporting portal: https://www.whitbychamber.org/covid-19-workplace-self-screening-program/.

Thank you to the Town of Whitby for their support of this program, our team for developing the website for our businesses to order and report (and helping deliver the tests to Clarington!) and lastly the Clarington Board of Trade for leveraging our remaining tests for the betterment of our business community.





Advocacy Committee Update

The committee has had a busy summer preparing for the federal election and following up on key issues with different elected officials. Pandemic measures remain a priority for the committee as we continue to engage political leaders in discussions around the impact of COVID-19 measures on businesses and the efficacy of government supports.

Recent highlights of advocacy activities include:

Meeting with MPP Lorne Coe and the Ministry of Transportation in August to discuss the province's report on toll roads. This was a productive discussion and members of the committee came prepared with questions centered on the equity of tolling additional highways in only one region. The committee further questioned whether or not there were plans to toll roads in other communities and there was some discussion around this being a possibility. That being said, the province assured the freeze on the toll rates would remain and

that they would continue to look at different options to increasing access to roadways.

Hosting the Whitby riding

federal election debate in September. A subgroup within the advocacy committee assisted WCC staff in organizing a debate for federal MP candidates for the 2021 federal election. The sub-group consisted of Peter Garrett, Matthew Mackenzie, Matthew Thornton and John Baynham. Laura Wilson from Baker Tilly once again moderated the event. Questions focused on key issues around business supports, housing, pandemic policies, taxation and more. The event was recorded by Rogers TV and can be found online at the following here.

Candidates who participated included Ryan Turnbull (incumbent Liberal party candidate), Maleeha Shahid (Conservative Party of Canada), Brian Dias (New Democratic Party) and Johannes Kotilainen (Green Party of Canada).

The candidates were approved based on WCC policy, which states:

To be included in Chamber events and activities for federal and provincial elections, a candidate must be:

- An individual officially recognized by a political party as their candidate for an election.
- An individual belonging to a political party that has secured at least five per cent of the valid ballots cast in the most recent general election (not a by-election). The five per cent total can be confirmed through Elections Ontario or Elections Canada.
- An individual belonging to a political party that has secured a seat in either the House of Commons or the Ontario Legislature

With the hearts of the Diversity, Equity and Inclusion (DEI) committee members in the right place, we continued with dedication to meet the objectives and principles that underpinned the committee's formation. I enjoyed every meeting with my fellow members. Each meeting is always lively with unabridged opinions and sincerity, leaving me all pumped up for the rest of the day.

Paul Pirri spoke at one of our meetings. He presented the Elevate Talent Initiative, which is a Black, Indigenous, People of Colour (BIPOC) Economic Development program that offers 50 – 75 training opportunities. The courses are delivered through a 90-day workforce development program with various partners involved,

including Ontario Tech University. Stay tuned for updates, Whitby!

Speaking about partners, incidentally, the DEI resource library is completed thanks to students from Trent University. It is our intent that the DEI resource library is curated from publicly available resources that amplify the voices of the communities relating to the subject. This resource library will continue to evolve as we welcome input from our members.

Also, I am happy to report that the membership census is completed. This census will assist WCC to plan for content and event that better reflect the make-up of its members and also the community of Whitby. In relation to that, WCC Rylie Wilton did an outstanding job harmonizing WCC community calendar with various DEI events. Do check out the calendar to know what event is around the corner.

There is so much work to be done, a lot more stones to turn. Rest assured, the DEI committee members and I will carry on checking all the boxes we set out to do. Please do reach out to WCC if you would like to contribute ideas or have questions.

WCC's Continued Advocacy Efforts

When various business organizations and levels of government began considering the concept of a vaccine passport, our members, community organizations and media reached out to the Whitby Chamber of Commerce (WCC) requesting our point of view. Instead of making assumptions, we agreed the best approach was to poll our members. With both the Ajax-Pickering Board of Trade and Greater Oshawa Chamber of Commerce doing the same, our plan was to ask the same questions and aggregate the data to get a solid number of responses to represent your collective point of view.

Sent to the individual listed as the main contact for each of our members, the WCC provided context (an overview of the federal vaccine passport concept and an alternative, but similar concept developed by the Toronto Board of Trade) and then asked 4 simple questions. Thank

you to all those that took a moment to guide our advocacy efforts! We are finding polls versus lengthy surveys to be very helpful to get a quick pulse from our membership.

Since having sent the poll, many public announcements have been made regarding mandatory vaccinations or proof of a negative COVID test, from MLSE, LIVEnation, post-secondary schools and I would imagine these announcements will continue, including the Provincial government confirming on August 17th that certain business categories are mandated to create policies for vaccination and testing. The issue will remain polarizing, but the Chamber will do its best to represent the membership. We haven't yet made any specific decisions for our events. but since March 2020 implemented precautions to ensure throughout this time in-person events, celebrations, grand

openings, milestone celebrations and office operations keep our team and guests as safe as possible. Throughout this time, we've been open, active and will continue to do our best to ensure our programming and advocacy efforts support you.

We'll continue to monitor and thank you again for reading the materials provided and responding so thoughtfully, and in the best interests of our community.

Whitby Chamber of Commerce - past, present and future 70 years as Whitby's voice of business

In the summer of 1928, steps were take to reactivate the dormant Board of Trade, which had not met for four years and was in danger of losing it's charter. The Board of Trade had represented Whitby's business community since 1898 and was closely associated with Town Council. On June 23, 1928, 20 businessmen met in the Town Clerk's office and elected the following officers:

.....R.A. Hutchinson (public school inspector)

Vice President....Theodore King (part owner of King Brothers Tannery)

for Whitby newspaper) Treasurer.......John R. Frost (Town

Clerk/Treasurer)

Shortly after the executive was formed, Dr. George H. Stevenson, Superintendent of the Ontario Hospital (now Whitby Hospital) and Rev. Dr. C.R. Carscallen, Principal of Ontario Ladies College (Now Trafalgar Castle School) were asked to join.

These men represented the largest employers in Whitby at that time. The inaugural meeting of the revived Board of Trade was held in the Town Hall (where the firehall now stands at Brock and Colbourne Streets) on July 20, 1928. Guest speakers were George W. McLaughlin, President of the newly formed Oshawa Chamber of Commerce, and the Oshawa Chamber's Secretary, Leon Fraser. In his speech, McLaughlin outlined the aims and objectives of a Chamber of Commerce and pointed out that, unlike a Board of Trade, (which was at that time a part of the municipal government) a Chamber of Commerce was an independent

On August 13, 1928, following up on McLaughlin's comments, the Whitby Board of Trade applied to the federal ernment for a charter as the Whitby Chamber of Commerce.

Except for a three year period during the Second World War, the Whitby Chamber of Commerce has been an integral part of the community for the past 70

In it's early years, the Chamber urged

the town to develop the harbour at Port Whitby, which had not been used for 30 years, and succeeded in bringing a small dredging company to town. The federal government said that it would improve the harbour if the Town and Chamber could bring in enough industry to warrant the cost of new docking facilities. Throughout the 1930's it was almost impossible to attract industry because of the Great Depression.

Business picked up during the Second World War, but there was so much time required to support the war effort that the Chamber ceased to operate by the

In the Spring of 1945, with the war in Europe over, the Chamber was revived by William Davidson, who served several terms as President, was Mayor of the Town from 1947-1949 and was one of the Chamber's best supporters. In order to attract industry, the Chamber made an arrangement with the Toronto Board of Trade in which the Chamber wouldpay a fee back to the Board for any industries sent to Whitby. Although the Chamber managed to attract a number of small industries in 1946 and 1947, the big break came in 1947 when Dunlop Canada announced it would move from Toronto

The deal was re-negotiated in 1953 and Dunlop opened in Whitby in 1955 with 250 employees. The arrangement cost the Whitby Chamber of Commerce \$2,500, but the benefits were uncount-

Dunlop sponsored the Whitby Dunlop's Hockey team which won the Work Hockey Championship against the Russian team in 1958, bringing international fame to our town.

The Whitby Chamber of Commerce arranged the town's Centennial celebrations in 1955 which led to a long standing tradition - the presentation of the Peter Perry Award to Whitby's outstanding citizen of the year.

To make this happen the Advocacy Committee created a subgroup to develop questions for the candidates around how they will build back the economy after the pandemic, federal debt and the deficit, taxes for businesses, trade, the labor market, housing, local issues and more! The committee then set up lights, microphones, moderators time keepers and invited Rogers TV to ensure our community would be able to get to know what our local candidates will be fighting for in office. When everything was in place we reached out to all political parties that met the Election Campaign Protocol to speak at the event.
