Key Learnings From My First Business Summit

For WCC's Business Summit - Resilience and Reinvention, I walked into the hall at Deer Creek Golf Course with my fresh coffee and croissant in hand (Thank you to our breakfast sponsor Durham College!) and was immediately drawn to the red MicroAge booth, our event sponsor. I spoke to Bill Noonan who helps MicroAge customers accelerate and strengthen their tech infrastructure, and efficiently integrate into our modern digital existence. Our conversation set the tone for what would be a day of exploring new opportunities and reinventing old strategies. So, how does one reinvent and become resilient?

Our first presenters were Brion Hendry of BDO and Dennis Croft of Durham College, who drew valuable comparisons between companies that adapt and those that remain rigid against market and consumer trends. One of my biggest takeaways from their talk was the frequency and speed with which the standards and "playbook" for businesses is changing; while historical trends showed such shifts every couple of decades, industries are now reinventing every couple of years. Is your business future ready? Is strategic and agile planning for the coming years part of your business' process? To tackle these challenges, the duo explored key areas businesses need to evaluate, including profit sources and a successful workforce.

Stratifying businesses for our ever evolving and challenging economic world is integral for their success and sustainability, and it looks different for everyone. Fortunately, the opportunities to reinvent can be endless if we make dedicated efforts to explore them. Our second speaker, Asif Khan from Ground Level Insights drew the crowd in with his company's "creepy cool" software that analyzes anonymous phone data to help clients determine how

and where their company should evolve. Do visitors to your business have other commonalities? Where are they visiting from? What opportunities for growth does this data expose? Is your business on the right track? The fact is, relevant and up-to-date data is invaluable and it should guide how we reinvent in order to make our risks calculated and minimal.

Denise Laframboise of LaframboiseMortgage.ca hosted a business panel with Mike Libbey from Your Bottom Line, Chris Vanclief of Brock St. Brewery, Rhonda Jessup from the Whitby Public Library, and Bruce Watson of Home Hardware. Their experience brought life to the ideas we were exploring as they shared how they were each able to reinvent and be resilient, while having fun! Whether it was Whitby Public Library going "viral", saving on office space and working from home in PJs, or having your customers' beers paired with the perfect book, the

panel highlighted how small and big ideas could open the window to exciting new opportunities. If we think about our services as always being in beta mode, we give ourselves permission to learn and grow; this in turn gives our customers the best we have to offer, always. Isn't that the whole point?

Returning to our tables after lunch, the audience had the honour to hear from Mark Harrison, the founder of MH3 Collective and we explored what it means to be a changemaker; because nothing really happens until each of us as individuals commit to action and growth. Mark spoke passionately about the change that was brought forth in him following the death of George Floyd, it inspired him to reevaluate how he held himself accountable to the tough realities and inequities of our society, both as a person of colour and a leader. He highlighted his 4 P's, purpose, passion, profit and people as priorities that guide him when he is planning the future of his work. Mark's address was

an important reminder that good work, that feeds and benefits not just you but also your community, involves identifying your strengths and privileges and how they fit into the needs of society; it's not only a productive approach but a just one too.

Our final speaker for the day was Allison Hector-Alexander, the Director of Diversity Equity and Inclusion at the Region of Durham. Building on Mark's message, she implored us to acknowledge all the ways that make us unique and the value of not only accepting those differences, but celebrating them. As Whitby's community grows and diversifies, we would be remiss if we did not explore all the new and exciting opportunities we have for collaboration; and it all begins from understanding who is in our community. Allison used the anecdote of Oprah's famous "everybody gets a car" giveaway, to wisely remind us that not everyone really needs a car, and how could we know what people actually needed if we didn't know them and meet them as they are? This knowledge allows us to

service our customers better and collaborate with our workforce more successfully.

If we want to strive in unique and unprecedented times it cannot be "business as usual", and the speakers at this year's summit honed in on the magic of the "unusual" and unprecedented when it comes to business success. As we saw at the summit this year, there are many ways to reinvent and be resilient against challenges, but knowledge, compassion, and a passion are essential building blocks.



The Whitby Chamber of Commerce (WCC) Advocacy Committee had a busy and enjoyable summer. A welcomed sign of summer was in-person events picking up some steam, which of course provided us with the opportunity to speak and meet with valued members – taking away a few tidbits of feedback along the way. We look forward to more events in the near future and hope to see you all there!

In addition to informal feedback at events, we have reviewed the results of our membership survey completed this summer. We paid close consideration to all of the feedback provided and we thank you for taking the time to complete it! After review, labour and skills shortage within the parameters of our business community is the number one issue for the next 12 months. We've heard you loud and clear.

To show our support for these issues, we recently wrote a letter to Honourable Doug Ford, Premier of Ontario, along with other pertinent Ministers, drawing attention to the Blueprint to Bolster Ontario's Prosperity, released by the Ontario Chambers of Commerce. The Blueprint respectfully offers insight and recommendations in key areas of concern, including labour market challenges, administrative burdens and regulatory structures, environmental and energy policies, local and regional transportation, support for small businesses and entrepreneurs, and the delivery and optimization of our health care services.

Lastly, Mayoral campaigning is in full swing as we look ahead to the municipal election on October 24. It is clear this is a very important election for our membership, as we had over 60 people join us for the Mayoral Forum held on September 14th.
